





Study Room Expansion!

If you've been in the library recently you may have noticed that books have been moved around. We are currently preparing for a small library renovation. During the construction period, Study Room 3 will not be available. However, we are aware of the high demand for our Study Rooms—so we are adding more! Once the project is complete the library will have a total of five Study Rooms, four of which will seat up to four people and one of which will fit up to eight people. This project will also create a small work area for our Collaboratory staff, so they can work and collaborate even more effectively!

The construction project will take place between January and April of 2025. We anticipate that the library may be noisy on some days, so you can pick up a pair of earplugs at the Information Desk if you need quiet. Most of the activity will be occurring between the color copier and the historical collection. Aside from the temporary unavailability of Study Room 3, we don't expect any other disruptions to programming or services. Our librarians are also ready to help if you are having trouble finding anything. We'll be posting status reports as construction progresses!

Virtual Author Visit with TJ Klune

Come have a magical evening with New York Times bestselling author **TJ Klune** as he talks about his new novel Somewhere Beyond the Sea. Klune's The House in the Cerulean Sea introduced Linus Baker, a caseworker in the Department in Charge of Magical Youth tasked with determining whether six magical children might bring about the end of the world, and Arthur Parnassus, the head of the orphanage where the children live. In Somewhere Beyond the Sea, Klune focuses on Arthur's story. Arthur loves with his whole heart so none of the children ever feel the neglect and pain that he once felt as an orphan on that very same island so long ago. But when Arthur is summoned to make a public statement about his dark past, he finds himself at the helm of a fight for the future that his family, and all magical people, deserve.

TJ Klune is the *New York Times* and *USA Today* bestselling and award-winning author of several novels. Being queer himself, Klune believes it's important—now more than ever—to have accurate, positive queer representation in stories.

Virtual Author Visit with Amanda Montell

Join us as we chat with the New York Times bestselling author Amanda Montell about her new book The Age of Magical Overthinking: Notes on Modern Irrationality. "Magical thinking" can be broadly defined as the belief that one's internal thoughts can affect unrelated events in the external world. Magical thinking attempts to restore agency amid chaos, but in The Age of Magical Overthinking, Montell argues that, in the information age, our brain's coping mechanisms have been overloaded. Montell delves into the cognitive biases that run rampant in our brains, from how the "halo effect" cultivates worship of celebrities to how the "sunk cost fallacy" can keep us in dysfunctional relationships. Her message is one of hope, empathy and forgiveness for our anxiety-laden selves.

Amanda Montell is a writer and linguist. She is the author of the books *Wordslut*, *Cultish and The Age of Magical Overthinking* and a host of the podcast *Sounds Like a Cult*. She holds a degree in linguistics from NYU and lives in Los Angeles with her partner, her plants and her pets.

Cardholder Perks for Readers!

Everyone knows that this library has books. Lots and lots of books. You may be thinking of a traditional hardcover book sitting on the shelf of the Fiction section, but there are many other ways to "read" a book.

Wallingford Library has non-traditional books like **eBooks** (downloadable books to read on your mobile device), and audiobooks in the form of **Books-On-CD**, **Playaways**, **and eAudiobooks** (downloadable audiobooks). The collections continue to grow for **Manga** and **Graphic Novels** in the Teen, Adult, and Juvenile sections. There are **Large Print** books and books printed in **Spanish**. The Children's Department carries books in a number of other **World Languages** like **Arabic** and **Chinese**!

Wondering what's good to read? Borrow *The New York Review of Books* for its in-depth reviews of fiction and non-fiction titles. We also have copies of *Book Page*, a free monthly magazine that recommends books across many genres. It's available near the self-checkout station. To find books that are similar to other books or authors you like, or who write in a similar style, visit the **NoveList Plus** website. When you search for a particular author or title, **Read-alikes** appear on the screen. Even simply searching our library's catalog and clicking on one of the results will display "**More Like This**," a list of titles with similar content.

Readers should also consider joining one of the library's book clubs. Dates and time of the discussions are listed in the **Words** newsletter.

And just a useful FYI, if you're tired of keeping a written list of the titles you've read, log in to your online account and **Opt In** to record your **reading history**. Going forward, each item you borrow will be listed. Later, you can even use a search feature to search your list for a title or author if you desire.

In our latest adventure, members of the Borrower Services Book Club go in search of copies of The Handmaid's Tale.

You won't believe how many ways there are to read a book!



Hibernation Book Club: Long Reads for Short Days

Don Quixote by Miguel de Cervantes Tuesday, Jan 14th & 28th, Feb 11th & 25th, Mar 11th & 25th 5:30-7pm | Collins Room & Zoom Discussion moderated by Readers Advisory Librarian Cindy Haiken

If you have always wanted to read big classic works of literature but have been daunted by their length and supposed complexity, we have a book club just for you! In the Hibernation Book Club, we will read one long classic novel every winter, dividing it up into shorter sections and meeting six times over the course of three months to work our way through it. Our title for the winter of 2025 is Edith Grossman's 2003 translation of *Don Quixote* by Miguel de Cervantes.



Told in two parts that were written ten years apart and widely regarded as the world's first modern novel and one of the funniest and most tragic books ever written, *Don Quixote* chronicles the famous (mis)adventures of an aging man named Alonso Quijano from La Mancha, Spain, who becomes so obsessed with chivalric novels that he believes himself to be a knight errant named Don Quixote and sets out on his old horse Rocinante on a series of absurd quests with his loyal squire Sancho Panza by his side. The novel highlights the clash between fantasy and reality while satirizing the conventions of traditional chivalry stories. It is one of the most-translated books in the world and one of the best-selling novels of all time. In 2002, 100 major writers from 54 countries rated *Don Quixote* the world's best work of fiction. In this six-part program, we will read *Don Quixote* in installments of approximately 160 pages each and meet every other week to discuss it.



There is something about a new calendar year that feels fresh and invigorating, all the more so when the first month of 2025 brings with it an unusually large number of new fiction releases. Here are some of the novels you can look forward to reading to usher in the New Year:

Ace, Marvel, Spy by Jenni Walsh — After her husband is killed in Germany during World War Two, a #1 tennis champion is asked by the US army to spy for them in Switzerland.

Beautiful Ugly by Alice Feeney — A man whose wife has been missing for a year travels to a tiny Scottish village where he sees a woman who looks just like her.

Been So Wrong It Feels Like Right by Walter Mosley — A jazz musician tries to find his estranged father while protecting a woman and her daughter from a violent billionaire.



Bronshtein in the Bronx by Robert Littell — A fictional account of ten pivotal weeks in the life of Leon Trotsky, inspired by his exile in New York City in 1917.

Clever Little Things by Helena Echlin — After the death of their babysitter, a mother notices terrifying changes in her daughter.

Confessions by Catherine Airey — After a young woman is orphaned on 9/11, she receives an offer from her estranged aunt to move into the home in Ireland where her parents lived when they were young.



Death of the Author by Nnedi Okorafor — The life of a 32-year-old woman becomes unhinged after she writes a science fiction novel that becomes a massive bestseller.

The Forger's Requiem by Bradford Morrow — In the final Forger novel, an art crook squares off against his nemesis for the last time.

Going Home by Tom Lamont — After a tragic loss, three men, none of whom are paternal, take charge of a toddler.

Good Dirt by Charmaine Wilkerson — A woman's life unravels when her brother is killed and a centuries-old family heirloom is shattered.


How to Sleep at Night by Elizabeth Harris — A happily married couple on opposite ends of the political spectrum find themselves at odds when



Max FAQs from Max Spurr

Can the Collaboratory help me create custom stamps?

Yes, we actually have a few ways that you can create custom stamps! One option is to use our Silhouette Mint stamp making machine which creates custom

stamps using a thermal technology. Because the stamps are created in this way, you do not ink them like a traditional stamp. Instead, you apply ink using a toothpick and blot the excess away. Then you have a stamp that will last for about 50 applications and can be re-inked here in the Collaboratory. Another option is to use the laser cutter to etch the design onto laser-safe rubber.

Last Words:





I recently had the chance to play PlayStation exclusive **Astro Bot**, a 3D platformer video game that was released in early fall 2024 in celebration of PlayStation's 30th anniversary. Nintendo fans may be familiar with recent 3D platformers such as *Super Mario Odyssey* or *Kirby and the Forgotten Land*. However, PlayStation has moved away from regularly

producing platformers in recent decades even though it has its roots in the genre. So, a platformer for the PlayStation console in 2024 is a rare treat! Astro Bot is also a really good platformer. As I'm writing this it was just announced that it won Game of the Year. The player controls Astro Bot, a robot character who ventures to different worlds in order to repair a crash-landed PlayStation 5 spaceship (the game is very meta). What makes Astro Bot so good is its unique use of the PS5 game controller and the way it easily displays thousands of unique assets onscreen without any lag. For instance, in an ice cream themed level all of the pathways are covered with thousands of giant sprinkles that respond individually as Astro Bot pushes through them. This physics engine is most apparent in levels in which Astro Bot can change size on a whim, becoming larger or smaller and interacting with the world in different ways. You can also tell exactly what kind of surface Astro Bot is walking on from unique vibrations and sounds emanating from the handheld controller. The game is not only joyful to play, but it is also a technological marvel. To celebrate PlayStation's 30th anniversary players must rescue other "bots" throughout the level who are cosplaying as characters from PlayStation's 30-year-old video game library—including many platformer icons from the 1990s and early 2000s. Luckily, some of these titles are available to borrow from the library. If you enjoyed *Astro Bot* as much as I did, here are some other platformer suggestions:



The first game you should play if you enjoyed *Astro Bot* (or if you are waiting for your library hold) is *Astro's Playroom*. *Astro's Playroom* is available to download from the PlayStation store *for free*! It's the original 2020 tech demo that featured the titular character and acts as a prologue to the 2024 game. Even though it's marketed as a tech demo, it consists of four

unique levels and a hub world, and it takes a few hours to complete. It will give you an idea for the look and feel of the full game (although I found *Playroom* to be slightly more challenging) as well as introduce the premise of Astro Bot's world.



One of the first cosplaying robots you will come across in *Astro Bot* is Crash Bandicoot, PlayStation's earliest gaming mascot. The original *Crash Bandicoot* trilogy has been remade as *Crash Bandicoot N. Sane Trilogy* for current gen consoles. Although its levels have a more linear design (and

even feature some 2D platforming) it's still one of the most challenging platformers out there. **Crash 4: It's About Time** was released in 2020 as a sequel to the original trilogy and makes use of new gimmicks for various levels.



Originally released alongside the Crash Bandicoot series, the *Spyro the Dragon* trilogy has also been remade as *Spyro Reignited Trilogy*. While Crash focuses on the speed at which players can get through the level, Spyro features levels with branching paths

and open hub worlds and rewards curious players who explore each level fully rather than the speed at which the level is completed, making it one of the more cozy platformers.



While other early platformers featured in *Astro Bot* like *Sly Cooper* and *Ape Escape* have not been so lucky to see remakes, the library does have the original *Jak and Daxter: The Precursor Legacy* available to borrow. *Jak and Daxter* is notable for being one of the first open world video

games without any load screens (like a precursor to *The Legend of Zelda: Breath of the Wild*). *Jak and Daxter* is slightly more story-driven than *Crash* and *Spyro* and more grounded in its world-building, but it still features platforming challenges and collectibles found across jungles, caves, mountains, and even sunken cities.



Ratchet and Clank is one of the longest-running PlayStation platformer franchises with its most recent game **Ratchet and Clank: Rift Apart** released in 2021. Like Astro Bot, Ratchet and Clank is a sci-fi adventure taking place across different planets and dimensions. While still retaining its platforming origins, Rift Apart also

utilizes third-player shooter elements for gameplay variety.



In 2017 Playtonic Games tried to recapture the style of 1997's platformer *Banjo-Kazooie* with **Yooka-Laylee**. Yooka-Laylee features book pages as its main collectables with each level taking place inside a book. There are the obligatory jungle and snow levels, but also a casino level which is very similar to *Astro Bot's*

own casino level. Like *Banjo-Kazooie*, *Yooka-Laylee's* levels are completely open-ended. Players continue to explore each level until they've collected enough pages to satisfy progression requirements.



If you're a Spongebob fan be sure not to miss **Battle for Bikini Bottom**. This is another one that was originally released back in 2003 but received a remake in 2020 for current gen consoles. You will play as Spongebob, collecting

golden spatulas in iconic locations such as Jellyfish

Fields, Goo Lagoon, the Kelp Forest, and Rock Bottom in order to stop Plankton's evil scheme. The remake was followed by a sequel **The Cosmic Shake** in 2023. Other notable platformers in the library's collection include **Kao the Kangaroo**, a game similar to *Crash*

Bandicoot, A Hat in Time, an anime-like platformer, and Journey to the Savage Planet, a game which combines elements

of *Metroid*, first-person shooter, and platformer.

Astro Bot is a love letter to PlayStation's forgotten genre. While it stands on its own, it also features parodies, cameos, and subtle references to video games throughout PlayStation's history. And if you've ever enjoyed any of the other platformers on this list you are sure to find something you love in Astro Bot.

Tax Season and Tax Assistance



Tax filing season is around the corner and the library is ready to help in partnership with the Human Resources Agency of New Britain.

Federal 1040 Income Tax Forms in both English and Spanish as well as 1040 Instruction Booklets typically arrive at the library in late January. You can also find the forms (and schedules) available online to download and print: rebrand.ly/IRSforms

The State of Connecticut encourages residents to file their income taxes electronically and no longer provides paper forms to Connecticut Libraries.

If you earned less than \$67,000 in 2024, you may be eligible for free tax preparation services from IRS-certified tax preparer volunteers through HRA of New Britain. In-person appointments at the library will take place on most Saturdays from 10am to 2pm starting Jan 27th until Apr 13th. You may call to make an appointment at (860) 356-2000.

Appointments fill up quickly so we encourage making an appointment as soon as possible! While librarians can help in finding the forms you need, the library staff is not involved in the tax preparation process. If you have questions about this tax preparation service, please contact HRA of New Britain at (860) 225-8601. We are proud to partner with VITA each year as one of their locations to provide this free, volunteer-run tax preparation service for Wallingford residents.


