Libraries & Literature in Prison Cellblocks: A Conversation about Freedom Reads

Freedom Reads, a national nonprofit based in Hamden, Connecticut, opens carefully-curated, 500-book, handcrafted libraries in prison cellblocks across the nation. As of the start of 2025, it has opened more than 400 Freedom Libraries in 44 adult and youth prisons across 12 states, including Connecticut and California. Its vision is to open a Freedom Library in every cellblock in every prison in the nation. Our panelists will share the perspectives of Freedom Reads, nearly half of whose staff are formerly incarcerated individuals, and a California prison system that has worked with Freedom Reads and witnessed its impact upon those serving time.

Jodi Picoult Wordsmith and Wonder Wednesday, April 2nd | 7-8pm | Zoom | Register

Join us as we chat with the New York Times bestselling author Jodi Picoult about her newest novel By Any Other Name. In 1581, Emilia Bassano has no voice of her own. But as the Lord Chamberlain's mistress, she has access to all the theaters in England and finds a way to bring her work to the stage in secret. And yet, creating some of the world's greatest dramatic masterpieces comes at great cost—by paying a man for the use of his name, she will write her own out of history. In the present, playwright Melina Green has just written a new work. Will she—like Emilia—be willing to forfeit her credit as author for a chance to see her work performed? Told in intertwining narratives, By Any Other Name is a tale of ambition, courage and desire that asks what price each woman is willing to pay to see their work live on, even if

it means they will be forgotten.

Jodi Picoult is the #1 New York Times bestselling author of 29 novels, including Mad Honey (co-authored with Jennifer Finney Boylan), Wish You Were Here, The Book of Two Ways, A Spark of Light, Small Great Things, Leaving Time, and My Sister's Keeper. She lives in New Hampshire with her husband.

Join horticulturalist Matthew Fleming as he guides us through the secret world of trees. Used for shelter, tools, fuel and food, they also help supply the atmosphere with oxygen and form astonishingly diverse ecosystems, along with some of the world's most beautiful landscapes. The Tree Book: The Stories, Science, and History of Trees reveals the intricate world of leafy woodlands and abundant rainforests. Combining

woodlands and abundant rainforests. Combining natural history and a scientific overview with a wider look at the history, uses, symbolism, and mythology of trees, this book is a new kind of guide to these fascinating organisms.

Matthew Fleming has been a horticulturist at the Smithsonian Gardens Greenhouse Facility in Maryland since 2010. In addition to serving as a

supervisory horticulturist, he manages three greenhouses with nearly a thousand tropical specimens that are displayed throughout the many Smithsonian gardens and landscapes along the National Mall during the warmer months. Matt received his Bachelor of Science degree from Penn State University's College of Agricultural Sciences where he studied Horticulture and Landscape Contracting.

Cardholder Perks for Language Learners

You've probably heard of language-learning apps like Babbel and Duolingo, but did you know that the library has its own program called **Transparent Language**? Create a free account and take self-paced lessons on over 120 world languages. You can even download the Transparent Language app on your phone to practice on the qo! (walpublib.org/ <u>TransparentLanguage</u>)

To supplement your online learning, visit the 400s in the Nonfiction section to find bilingual dictionaries, workbooks, and other materials for languages, including English, Spanish, French, Italian, Japanese, Polish, Russian, and many others. (walpublib.org/LanguageBooks)

For those learning English as a Second Language (ESL), the library offers a number of helpful resources. Transparent Language offers English lessons tailored to the learner's native language or dialect. Online ESL

courses are also available on **UniversalClass** (walpublib.org/UniversalClass). In the Children's Room, an exciting recent addition to our ESL resources is our growing collection of **Wonderbooks**: print books with built-in audiobooks that read the story aloud as you follow the words on the page.

For Spanish-speakers, both fluent and otherwise, peruse our **Spanish-language section** to find Spanish translations of popular titles as well as books written in Spanish. (walpublib.org/SpanishBooks)

After you've studied on your own, practice your new language skills with other learners at all proficiency levels by attending our weekly Spanish and French groups. ASL Conversation Group and American Sign Language for Kids meet monthly.

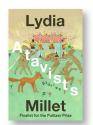

Here is a small sample of all the new novels scheduled for publication in April:



Atavists by Lydia Millet — Linked short stories that explore generational conflict and class.

Audition by Katie Kitamura — An elegant actress meets a troubled young man for lunch, starting a complex relationship that challenges both their professional and their personal lives.

Bad Nature by Ariel Courage — A woman with a terminal diagnosis decides to fulfill her lifelong dream of killing her father.

The Bright Years by Sarah Damoff — A husband and wife are deeply in love but each has secrets that they are unwilling to share with the other.



The Correspondent by Virginia Evans — A divorced grandmother is a devoted gardener and letter writer until she receives a note that forces her to revisit a painful episode from her past.

The Eights by Joanna Miller — In 1920, four women from different backgrounds forge a bond as the first female students at Oxford University.

The Family Recipe by Carolyn Huynh — The founder of a Vietnamese sandwich chain is ready to retire and decides to force his estranged children to compete for their inheritance.

The Float Test by Lynn Streger Strong — Four estranged siblings reunite in the aftermath of a family tragedy.

Gifted & Talented by Olivie Blake — Three telepathically and electrokinetically gifted siblings vie to replace their dead father as CEO of the family business.

Great Big Beautiful Life by Emily Henry — An uptight woman asked a notorious flirt to teach her how to be more confident.

The Griffin Sisters' Greatest Hits by Jennifer Weiner — 20 years after their band broke up, two sisters still aren't speaking, and one of their daughters wants to know why.

The Wildelings by Lisa Harding — The friendship between two lifelong friends is threatened when

they meet a charming philosophy student at their art college in Dublin.



Zeal by Morgan Jerkins — After being discharged from the Union Army as a free many in 1865, a formerly enslaved man returns to Mississippi to try to reunite with the woman he loves.

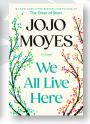

Last Words:

How to Read a Poem from Chris Ciemniewski

In Monica Wood's *How to Read a Book*, the prison book club members have meaningful discussions about poetry, most notably *Spoon River Anthology* by Edgar Lee Masters. A <u>survey from 2022</u> has shown that while 51% of Americans read books, only 11.5% of Americans read poetry. While novels and nonfiction can help us understand experiences through narrative, poetry more often channels raw and innate emotions through minimalist language. A Google search for "Why is poetry important?" will return countless results, but the library also has books that answer the same question. If you've never been able to get into poetry or just want to understand why people enjoy it, these books might be for you.



If you prefer a formal, but approachable introduction and education on poetry, I highly recommend *Poems*, *Poets*, *Poetry* by the writer and literary critic Helen Vendler, who sadly passed away just last year. This was one of the first books assigned to me during my undergraduate studies as an English major and in retrospect it remains one of the most enjoyable. Vendler sprinkles poems liberally throughout the book and in doing so curates a book that is as much a collection of poems as it is a book about poetry.

There are no lengthy paragraphs interpreting the meaning of the poem and instead Vendler focuses on the writing techniques. Vendler introduces a single concept as succinctly as possible and then provides a poem or two that emphasize the concept. By starting off simply and slowly building up the readers' understanding of poetry bit by bit, this method also exposes readers to some of the most famous, well-loved, and well-written poems in the English repertoire. And while not all readers will love every poem presented, there are sure to be a handful that bring delight.



If you would prefer a lengthier, close reading of specific poems, check out *Ten Windows* by Jane Hirshfield. In each of the ten chapters, Hirshfield introduces a literary technique or genre and then analyzes a handful of poems that exemplify each chapter's discussion points. While Vendler's book sticks primarily to poetic structure and techniques, Hirshfield discusses the empathetic nature of poetry and how it deepens our understanding of the shared human experience.

But perhaps you'd like to understand why people enjoy poetry without actually having to read any in which case *Why Poetry Matters* by Jay Parini might be the best choice for you. It's a small book (just over 175 pages) that explains in nine chapters why poetry is important. Each chapter focuses on a single reason that poetry matters, including the way poems use language artistically in a way few other mediums do, how poetry allows a pure personal voice to express emotions in a way that cannot be done otherwise, and how poetry is part of a human tradition dating back thousands of years, perhaps even our original form for artistic linguistic expression.

Don't Read Poetry by Stephanie Burt is a collection of essays (although it includes poems sparingly) focusing on the reasons people read or write poetry and how poems speak to one another. Burt discusses how finding the right poem at the right time can shift one's view of

the world and how poets in turn channel their experience of the world through their poetry. Ultimately she doesn't want readers to come away thinking of poetry as good or bad, but instead she hopes the reader will ponder what purpose each poem serves either to the reader or the writer

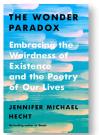


Poetry will Save Your Life by Jill Bialosky makes for a perfect follow-up to Burt's book. In it, poet Bialosky chronicles the poems that she encountered in her life during pivotal moments and why each of those poems was so important to her. For anyone who still might be wondering how exactly poetry moves some people, Bialosky describes in detail why each poem was so meaningful to her and opens the door for readers to think about poetry in the same way.



Similarly, *Who Reads Poetry* is a collection of essays by 50 contributors to *Poetry Magazine*. Each of them writes about their most meaningful experience with poetry. Some write about the first poem that truly moved them and why, while others talk about how a certain poem helped them through a difficult phase of their life. Some contributors discuss more broadly how poetry affects their life on a daily basis and others share lighter, more amusing stories about how poems can

sometimes fall into our hands seemingly as a cosmic joke or to provide us with connections between what might otherwise be two disparate ideas. In this book, there is no lack of examples of how poetry can move anyone on a deeper level.



If you don't want to read poetry and you don't want to read books about poetry, but you still want to receive the mystic wisdom that so many people take away from poetry, then *The Wonder Paradox* is the book for you! Historian and poet Jennifer Michael Hecht takes all her poetic wisdom and packages it in a way that has nothing to do with poetry. She structures the book by topics such as making decisions, showing gratitude, celebrating holidays, coming of age, funerals, depression, and

morality. She then asks what poets such as Sappho and Shakespeare and Rumi have to say about these topics. She distills the knowledge of ages into essays and then helps readers to find the right poem that will speak to them on any of the given topics.



If all of these books fail you, I recommend *Eating Salad Drunk*, a collection of irreverent Haikus (one of the shortest poetic forms) from comedians focusing on the absurdity of contemporary life. Even with their vulgarity they do what all good poetry does: reveal that grain of truth at the heart of all humanity.

Tax Season and Tax Assistance



Tax filing season is around the corner and the library is ready to help in partnership with the **Human Resources Agency of New Britain**.

Federal 1040 Income Tax Forms in both English and Spanish as well as 1040 Instruction Booklets typically arrive at the library in late January. You can also find the forms (and schedules) available online to download and print: rebrand.ly/IRSforms

The State of Connecticut encourages residents to file their income taxes electronically and no longer provides paper forms to Connecticut Libraries.

You can file your CT State Income Tax forms electronically here: rebrand.ly/CTefile Or you can download and print paper forms here: rebrand.ly/CTtaxforms

If you earned less than \$67,000 in 2024, you may be eligible for free tax preparation services from IRS-certified tax preparer volunteers through HRA of New Britain. In-person appointments at the library will take place on most Saturdays from 10am to 2pm starting Jan 27th until Apr 13th. You may call to make an appointment at **(860) 356-2000** or visit their website through this shortened link: **walpublib.org/VITA**

Appointments fill up quickly so we encourage making an appointment as soon as possible! While librarians can help in finding the forms you need, the library staff is not involved in the tax preparation process. We are proud to partner with VITA each year as one of their locations to provide this free, volunteer-run tax preparation service for Wallingford residents.
