



The Fluharty is a norm-referenced test which will provide results regarding your child's speech and language development. The screening will take approximately 20 minutes to complete and provide standard scores which are then compared to age appropriate scores.



# New in Novels by Cindy Haiken

In a scene late in his brilliant novel *Dandelion Wine*, Ray Bradbury perfectly sums up the end of summer: "And then, quite suddenly, summer was over. He knew it first when walking downtown. Tom grabbed his arm and pointed, gasping, at the dime store window. They stood there unable to move because of the things from another world displayed so neatly, so innocently, so frighteningly, there. 'Pencils, Doug, ten thousand pencils!'" While back-to-school items may cause dismay for some, book lovers know that the shift in the calendar from August to September marks the beginning of the fall publishing season, when the biggest books of the year are typically released. Here are some of the novels slated for publication this month to get the ball rolling:



**Blue Sisters** by Coco Mellors — After the unexpected death of their sister, the remaining three Blue sisters return to New York to stop the sale of the apartment they grew up in.

**Colored Television** by Danzy Senna — A struggling writer and a Hollywood producer begin to develop "the Jackie Robinson of biracial comedies" for a streaming network.


**Creation Lake** by Rachel Kushner — A seductive and cunning American woman infiltrates an anarchist collective in France. Longlisted for the 2024 Booker Prize for Fiction.

**Entitlement** by Rumaan Alam — A woman tries not to be seduced by money while she works as an assistant to a billionaire who is in the process of giving away his huge fortune.



**The Examiner** by Janice Hallett — A story told in texts, emails and essays about a group of six Royal Hastings University students in a Masters in Art program.


**Here One Moment** by Liane Moriarty — Passengers on an airplane learn of the predicted dates of their deaths from a mysterious woman known as "The Death Lady."



**The Life Impossible** by Matt Haig — A woman is left a house on a Mediterranean island by a long-lost friend and arrives in Ibiza with no guidebook and no plan.

**Madwoman** by Chelsea Bieker — After a woman covers up her past to achieve her dream life, a letter from prison brings her past into the present, threatening everything.


# Out of the Woods: A Palate Cleanser

With the summer winding down and school starting up, September is the perfect time of the year to check out short books and media to finish off the sunshine season. You can find a selection of short reads on display across from the Reference Desk this September. Here are some I discovered recently:

If you're hesitant (like me) to see the upcoming live-action adaptation of Harold and the Purple Crayon for fear that it is not faithful to the spirit of the source material, Ross Ellenhorn's **Purple Crayons** might be more satisfying for you. Ellenhorn goes through the classic picture book page-bypage in a philosophical reading of the text to determine what Harold and his purple crayon can teach readers about life.

In what seems like an homage to Harold and the Purple Crayon, Aaron Becker has written a beautiful wordless picture book trilogy (things usually work best in threes) with **Journey**, **Quest**, and **Return**. The trilogy features magic crayons which open portals to a fantastical kingdom and can also animate anything drawn with them.

While he was inventing languages and dreaming up cosmologies, J.R.R. Tolkien was also a father telling bedtime stories to his kids. One of them, **Roverandom**, tells the story of the family dog which embarks on a fantasy adventure that feels like a parody of Tolkien's Middle-earth epic.

Better known for his high-fantasy series, The Chronicles of Prydain, Lloyd Alexander similarly wrote a fantasy story featuring a family pet. Time Cat follows a cat that is able to travel through history using the power of its nine lives.

While possibly more well-known to Western audiences for its anime adaptation featuring colorful anthropomorphic cats, **Night on the Milky Way Railway** is a classic Japanese fantasy novella by Kenji Miyazawa. The episodic narrative depicts the existential journey of a series of passengers aboard a celestial train.

Another one for cat-lovers, **Cats of Malta** is an hour long documentary available to watch on Kanopy about the small Mediterranean island's large number of feral cats and their interactions with local humans. In this tight-knit island society, the cats are just as much a part of the community as the people.

If you are a goose-lover, be sure not to miss **Untitled Goose Game**. In this minimalist video game, players traverse a small British village as an obnoxious goose that causes havoc for town residents by stealing garden rakes, digging up flowers, and generally just being a noisy annoyance.

**Orbital** is the longest short book on this list and was recently longlisted for the 2024 Booker Prize. The narrative portrays the interactions and thoughts of six astronauts in orbit as they meditate on the mundanity and complexities of human existence while orbiting the planet we call home.

As its title adequately suggests, **Hobbit Virtues** by Christopher A. Snyder analyzes what we can learn about living a more minimal, but fulfilling existence from J.R.R. Tolkien's most endearing fictional race.

Coda is a 9-minutes short film available on Kanopy that asks and answers the question, "What if we could have one last adventure before we die?"

> Finally, **The Garden of Words** is a short anime that showcases the universal melancholy felt when two kindred souls meet for a brief period of time, and are unable to remain in each others' lives beyond their chance meeting.

Languages may begin as vast, indecipherable forests, but can be cultivated into intimate gardens of words.
