# CONNECTICUT'S WITCHCRAFT TRIALS

Tuesday, Oct 22<sup>nd</sup> | 7-8pm | Community Room & Zoom | Click to Register The harrowing story of the hanging of witches in Colonial New England continues to haunt our present-day imagination. Most of Connecticut's witchcraft trials and executions predated the more famous Salem witch panic by over 40 years. In this fascinating presentation by the Connecticut Museum of History & Culture, you will hear the stories of the women and men accused, tried, and executed as witches and learn how Connecticut managed to control the spread of witch accusations long before Salem erupted in panic and violence. You will also learn about the final witchcraft trial in New England, which infamously took place right here in Wallingford when, in 1697, a brief resurgence of superstition led to the indictments of Mrs. Winifred Benham and her thirteen-year-old daughter.







# **Building Your Family Tree**

Celebrate Family History Month with us! In this one-of-a-kind presentation, genealogist **Denise Page** will share her experience of discovering her maternal family ancestry. Her journey was complicated by a number of factors, including orphancy, mixed ancestry, and the interchange of family first names. Despite these obstacles, she unearthed pre-1850 information about an enslaved ancestor and his descendants who lived in New Haven and attended Yale. How? By listening curiously, researching, using intuition, and having a heaping dose of luck. Denise unlocked some keys that may help you in your own ancestral journey. This 90-minute talk begins with Denise's personal story and then provides an opportunity for participants to reflect on their own family story, along with a list of nontraditional resources to continue or begin your search.

For digitization, along with the old media, please bring hardware storage like an external hard drive or flash drive if you do not have cloud storage such as iCloud, Google Drive, or Dropbox. Note that conversions are real-time, so 3 hours of home movies will take 3 hours to digitize. You need to remain in the Collaboratory with your media during the digitization process. The Collaboratory staff is happy to help you get started.



# A Coven of Witches by Chris Ciemniewski

Witches have pervaded human culture since time immemorial, with different symbolism and dispositions applied to them across the centuries. Originally used to describe people who obtained their powers from the natural world rather than divine forces, the term "witch" later became an accusatory term

for anyone who did not fit in with society. Today, witch stories range from sinister to silly and imaginary to historical. Many of these modern witch stories also seek to reclaim the term from its historical deragoatory connotion and make it a term of empowerment.

For anyone who enjoys fairytale retellings, **The Book of Gothel** by Mary McMyne revisits the story of Rapunzel from would-be-Gothel's point of view. Like Wicked and Maleficent, this retelling sets out to humanize Gothel and begins with her being shunned by the residents of her village for being too odd for their society.

**Black Leopard, Red Wolf** is a sword and sorcery novel by Marlon James which draws inspiration from African history and mythology for both its story and its narrative structure. The novel features the "Moon Witch," a hunter of men who abuse women. This character is explored more in the sequel Moon Witch, Spider King.

If you're looking for a hauntingly faithful historical fiction portrayal of the Salem Witch Trials, you might try The Heretic's Daughter by Kathleen Kent. It follows the life of Martha Carrier, one of the first women to be accused of witchcraft. Author Kathleen Kent was inspired to write about the topic after she traced her ancestry back to Martha Carrier.

England was also enduring a witchhunting frenzy. Margaret Meyer's **The Witching Tide** takes place in a small coastal seventeenth century English village and focuses on longtime


resident Martha Hallybread, who is enlisted by the witchfinder Silas Makepeace to investigate her neighbors.



Vanessa Yu's Magical Paris Tea Shop is a romantic dramedy witch story which may appeal to fans of Hayao Miyzaki's Kiki's Delivery Service. The novel features reluctant witch Vanessa Yu who is able to see people's fortunes at the bottom of tea cups. However, Vanessa finds this ability more of a curse than an asset and sets out with her aunt to visit a Parisian Tea Shop that may be able to rid her of these powers.






