


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

A Navajo Investigator's Search for the Unexplained: In Conversation with Stanley Milford, Jr. Thursday, Nov 7th | 7-8 pm | Zoom | Click to register

As a Native American with parents of both Navajo and Cherokee descent, Stanley Milford, Jr. grew up in a world where the supernatural was both expected and taboo, where shapeshifters roamed, witchcraft was a thing to be feared, and children were taught not to whistle at night. When he joined the Navajo Rangers—a law enforcement branch of the Navajo Nation that are equal parts police officers, archeological conservationists and historians—the paranormal became part of his job. Alongside addressing the duties of overseeing the massive 27,000-square-mile reservation, Milford was assigned to bizarre cases involving mysterious livestock mutilations, Bigfoot sightings, UFOs and malicious hauntings. In *The Paranormal Ranger*, Milford recounts the stories of



Native American worldview and investigative training collide to provide an eerie account of what logic dictates should not be possible.



About the Author: Stanley Milford, Jr., graduated from the United States Indian Police Academy at the Federal Law Enforcement Training Center in Artesia, New Mexico. He worked as a law enforcement officer for 23 years and served as the delegated Chief Navajo Ranger, overseeing the Special Projects Unit which investigates cases that do not fit within everyday parameters of law enforcement, many of which involve reports of the paranormal or supernatural. After leaving the Navajo Rangers, he served as the senior investigator for the Navajo Nation's White Collar Crime Unit.

On Childhood Migration from Central America — In Conversation with Javier Zamora Thursday, Nov 14th | 4-5 pm | Zoom | Click to register

Tune in for a conversation with *New York Times* bestselling author **Javier Zamora** as he chats with us about his riveting tale of survival and perseverance as told in his award-winning memoir *Solito*. Zamora takes a 3,000 mile journey from his small town in El Salvador through Guatemala and Mexico and

across the U.S. border. He leaves behind his aunt and grandparents to reunite with a mother who left four years ago and a father he barely remembers. Traveling alone amid a group of strangers and a "coyote" hired to lead them to safety, Javier expects his trip to last two short weeks. He cannot foresee the perilous boat trips, relentless desert treks, pointed guns, arrests and deceptions that await him; nor can he know that those two weeks will expand into two

life-altering months alongside fellow migrants who will come to encircle him like an unexpected family.

About the Author: Javier Zamora was born in El Salvador in 1990. When he was nine, Javier migrated through Guatemala, Mexico, and the Sonoran Desert. His debut poetry collection, *Unaccompanied*, explores the impact of the war and immigration on his family. Zamora has been a Stegner Fellow at Stanford and a Radcliffe Fellow at Harvard and holds fellowships from the National Endowment for the Arts and the Poetry Foundation.





As the clocks turn back and the days grow shorter, it's time to pull out the thick blankets and plan for some longer evenings filled with great books. Here are some November fiction releases to get you started:



The Author's Guide to Murder by Beatriz Williams, Lauren Willig and Karen White — A locked-room mystery and a literary satire by three bestselling novelists.

Christmas with the Queen by Hazel Gaynor and Heather Webb — As preparations begin for the royal Christmas at Sandringham House in 1952, a young Queen Elizabeth II is trying to find her way as a new monarch.



The City and Its Uncertain Walls by Haruki Murakami — In the near future, shadows become disconnected from a person's body, and a Dream Reader reviews people's dreams.

City of Night Birds by Juhea Kim
— After a career-halting accident,
prima ballerina Natalia Leonova
returns to St. Petersburg to confront
her past and to decide whether to
rejoin the stage amidst the cutthroat

world of Russian ballet.

The Collaborators by Michael Idov — A brilliant young intelligence officer and a troubled heiress stumble into a global conspiracy that pits Russia against the CIA.

Double Barrel Bluff by Lou Berney — A former mob wheelman is dragged into a high-stakes hostage rescue among the mighty temples and shadowy underground of Cambodia.

Every Arc Bends Its Radian by Sergio de la Pava – A private investigator in New York City takes on a missing person case in Colombia.



The Gardener's Plot by Deborah Benoit — A woman who helps to set up a community garden in the Berkshires finds a body in one of the plots on opening day.

An Insignificant Case by Phillip Margolin — A third-rate lawyer who has led an unremarkable life is appointed to be the attorney for a crackpot artist.



Is She Really Going Out with Him? by Sophie Cousens — A recently-divorced woman agrees to go out with seven different men chosen for her by her children.

Lazarus Man by Richard Price

— The lives of a large and disparate group of people are affected by the collapse of a tenement in Harlem in 2008



Munichs by David Peace — Manchester United's assistant manager attempts to rebuild the team in time for the FA Cup final after eight players are killed in a plane crash.

Only Here, Only Now by Tom Newlands — A teenager comes of age in post-industrial Scotland and wants much more from life than her city has to offer.

Pictures of You by Emma Grey — A woman survives a car crash that kills her husband and can't remember either him or the accident.

Pony Confidential by Christina Lynch — A grumpy horse must somehow save the only human he's ever loved after he learns that she has been accused of a murder he knows she didn't commit.




Shy Creatures by Clare Chambers — An art therapist in 1960s London grows close to a patient at the psychiatric hospital where she works.

The Sunflower House by Adriana Allegri — Family secrets come to light as a young woman fights to save herself and others in a Nazi-run baby factory during World War Two.






Last Words— Pilgrimages by Chris Ciemniewski



As we approach American Thanksgiving, we'll doubtless hear stories about the Pilgrims, the Native Americans, and the first Thanksgiving. While the exact details of the first Thanksgiving are difficult to verify, we do know quite a bit about the Pilgrims. The Pilgrims left England for "The New World" in the 1630s because they believed the Roman Catholic Church had too much influence over the Church of England. Originally used as a term for people making trips to the Holy Land, the journey of the Plymouth Pilgrims popularized the term

"pilgrim" to refer to anyone who was traveling on a long religious, spiritual, or cultural journey. While there are numerous books written about their voyage to North America, what is lesser known is how many of the Pilgrims decided to return home. As revealed by Susan Hardmann Moore in *Pilgrims:* New World Settlers and the Call of Home (973.2 HAR), over a third of the early settlers decided to return to England, viewing America not as a destination itself, but as a stage in their journey.

Two of the most well-known fictional pilgrimages are Paul Bunyan's metaphorical **A Pilgrim's Progress** and Geoffrey Chaucer's satirical **Canterbury Tales**. The narrative structures of both of these works has been influential in many modern pilgrimage stories.




Dan Simmons' **Hyperion** is a sci-fi novel thematically similar to Frank Herbert's Dune, but written in the style of the Canterbury Tales. It features seven characters of different backgrounds and beliefs, including a Christian, a Muslim, and a Jew, on the final pilgrimage to the planet Hyperion just as an apocalyptic war is about to break out among humanity's colonized worlds. On the way to their destination, The Time Tombs, each character recounts their previous visit to the planet and reveals their reason for returning. Like the

Canterbury Tales, each "tale" is told in a different style, including a series of missionary journal entries, an action-filled war story, a noir detective mystery, and a star-crossed romance.

Another modern classic is **The Unlikely Pilgrimage of Harold Fry** by Rachel Joyce. In this novel, Harold Fry sets out on a six hundred mile walk from Kingsbridge to Berwickupon-Tweed to visit Queenie Hennessy, a woman he once knew who is now dying in hospice. Like A Pilgrim's Promise, Harold encounters many people along his journey, each of whom has something to teach him about his life to help rejuvenate his spirit.






A journey to the Holy Land of the Abrahamic faiths is one of the most well-known pilgrimages. Bruce Feiler's Walking the **Bible** (956 FEI) is a secular travelogue of the sites described in the five books of Moses, while Ziauddin Saradar's Mecca: The Sacred City (297.352 SAR) describes the history and experience of visiting Islam's holy



Some traditionally religious pilgrimages have become ways for travelers to experience and learn about local architecture, customs, and cultures. **The** Road to Santiago (818.5403 HAR) describes the Way of St. James (or, the Camino de Santiago) which begins on the French border with Spain and culminates at the Shrine of the Apostle James near the Atlantic coast. Author Kathryn Harrison recounts three separate journeys she has taken along the route in the style of journal entries, noting the similarities and differences among her three journeys depending on the company she had along the way.


Pilgrimages to visit the burial places of saints remain popular, especially in local communities. The atonement pilgrimage through the Sonoran desert from Nogales, Arizona to the burial site of Saint Francis Xavier in Magdalena, Mexico has been popularized in song by Brandon Flowers' <u>Magdalena</u>. **Saint Everywhere** (270.0925 CAR) by Mary Lea Carroll describes eight pilgrimages associated with women saints around the world, including one close to home, St. Elizabeth Ann Seton in New York City.



Author and journalist Timothy Egan recounts his personal spiritual pilgrimage to reconcile his Irish Catholicism in **A Pilgrimage to Eternity** (263.0424 EGA). His pilgrimage is both physical and metaphorical as he traces his Christian roots from Canterbury Cathedral, the place where Christianity was first introduced to pagan Britain, to Rome, which he refers to as the "cradle of Christianity.'

Although pilgrimages are often associated with the Abrahamic faiths, they are not limited to those traditions. In 1999, Geri Larkin was invited on a pilgrimage through the Buddhist monasteries of South Korea and was the first Western woman to be so honored. Her experience is recounted in her memoir First You Shave Your Head (294.344 LAR). Zen


Baggage (951.06 POR) is an account of Chinese translator Bill Porter's journey across China to visit sites associated with the six patriarchs of Zen. Porter similarly notes that many of the locations he visited are places few Westerners have been give the opportunity to visit.



BECOMING ODYSSA .

Among nature lovers and naturalists there are few locations so alluring as a journey to Walden Pond, where Thoreau arguably brought lasting awareness of the American transcendental movement. Walking Towards Walden (917.444 MIT) by John Hanson Mitchell describes such a journey. There are also countless travelogues by hikers describing their time on the Appalachian Trail, a miletone journey for many hikers. Bill Bryson's **A Walk in the Woods** (917.4044 BRY) may be the most famous due to the author's wit, but if you want to read more about the experience you can also pick up **Becoming Odyssa** (796.5109 DAV) by Jennifer Pharr Davis, **Walking Home** (796.5109 WIN) by Kelly Winters, or **On the Beaten Path** (796.5109 RUB) by Robert Alden Rubin. In addition, Almost Somewhere (796.5109 ROB) by Suzanne Roberts describes her twenty-eight days on the John Muir Trail.

Gideon Lewis Kraus posits that "in medieval times, religious pilgrimages gave the average Joe his only excuse to get away." In his memoir **A Sense of Direction** (910.4 LEW). Kraus uses this time-honored excuse to get out and partake in three separate journeys: "The thousand-year-old *Camino de Santiago*, a solo circuit of eighty-eight Buddhist temples on the Japanese island of Shikoku, and, together with his father and brother, an annual mass migration to the



tomb of a famous Hasidic mystic in the Ukraine." Kraus recounts each in a witty and irreverent, but no less inspiring, voice.



Spurred to write about pilgrimages by the rise in popularity of the Camino de Santiago, Peter Stanford explores the reasons why they remain popular in an ever more secular society in *Pilgrimage: Journeys* of *Meaning* (203.51 STA). In each of twelve chapters, Stanford describes a different pilgrimage from around the globe, providing its historical context, physical journey, and how the changing times have impacted each experience. His goal is to understand why so many

people still feel so spiritually transformed just by placing one foot in front of the other.
