


Virtual Author Events

An Exploration of Friendship, Reckoning, and Hope with Shelby Van Pelt

Join us as we chat with the author Shelby Van Pelt about her bestselling debut novel *Remarkably Bright Creatures*. *Remarkably Bright Creatures* is a luminous book about a woman's unlikely friendship with a giant Pacific octopus reluctantly residing at the local aquarium and the truths she finally uncovers about her son's disappearance. After Tova Sullivan's husband died, she began working the night shift at the Sowell Bay Aquarium, mopping floors and tidying up. Keeping busy has always helped her cope, which she's been doing since her 18-year-old son Erik mysteriously vanished on a boat in the Puget Sound over 30 years ago. As she works, Tova gets to know curmudgeonly Marcellus, a giant Pacific octopus living at the aquarium. Marcellus knows more than anyone can

imagine, but wouldn't dream of lifting one of his eight tentacles for his human captors—until

he forms an unlikely friendship with Tova. Van Pelt's novel is an exploration of friendship and hope and a reminder that sometimes taking a hard look at the past can help uncover a future that once felt impossible.



Shelby Van Pelt's debut novel *Remarkably Bright Creatures* was published in the spring of 2022 and was an instant *New York Times* bestseller. To date, it has sold a million and a half copies. Born and raised in the Pacific Northwest, she's now missing the mountains in the Chicago area with her husband and two children.



Cardholder Perks for Educators & Students!

School is starting up soon. Yay! Educators who teach in Wallingford are eligible for **Teacher Library Cards** that allow them to borrow Wallingford Library materials for the academic year (September – June). There are so many resources for teachers and their students here!

In the Children's Department: Teaching a unit about a particular theme for your elementary

level students? Borrow a **Red Bag** containing a variety of books about the topic, be it apples, feelings, colors, or other themes. For little readers, a large selection of **Beginning Reader** books are offered for those at different reading levels. Also available are kits called **Book Packs** which include books and an audiobook to listen to while you read along, **Reading Readiness** kits that emphasize pre-reading skills, and online literacy resources including **Bookflix** and **Playgarden Prep.** Once your young reader is ready for their first chapter book, we have numerous **early chapter book series** that are just right for their reading level. And don't forget the Wonder Room's **STEAM take-home kits**, learning tools and games that teach Science, Technology, Engineering, Art, and Math skills. If your child is a reluctant reader, introducing them to **graphic novels** may be a good way to encourage them to read. We have a growing collection of graphic literature including many of the most popular series. And

If you're teaching a child another language, the **World Languages** collection has books in many other languages. For online learning, navigate to the kid-friendly version of **Transparent Language** called **KidSpeak**. (walpuplib.org/TransparentLanguage)

remember, you can always place holds yourself on any title by logging in to your online library account! (walpublib.org/children)

In the Teen Department: There are numerous resources for older students as well, such as a dedicated Teen Area with computers, study areas, and a wide variety of books including graphic novels, manga, and Young Adult fiction and nonfiction. The library also offers online access to academic journals, magazines, and newspapers for a school projects through the researchIT CT database (researchitct.org) and more. For a school presentation that stands out, the Collaboratory has tons of software and equipment to design and make your very own project!

Those preparing for college entrance exams can borrow **test preparation books** or visit **Learning Express** online to take practice exams and review study guides. Study rooms can be reserved for your studying or tutoring needs. Be sure to reserve a room in advance. We also have **copiers**, **printers** (including **wireless printing**) and there's always free Wi-Fi — No password required! (walpublib.org/LearningExpress)

New in Novels by Cindy Haiken

In her classic novel The

Summer Book, the Finnish author Tove Jansson writes: "Every year, the bright Scandinavian summer nights fade without anyone noticing. One evening in August you have an errand outdoors, and all of a sudden it's pitch black. It is still summer, but the summer is no longer alive." Luckily, here in New England, our summers linger longer, and so do the summer book releases. Here are some of the novels slated for publication in August that will be terrific company for the dog days of the month:



And So I Roar by Abi Daré — A woman accidentally overhears a conversation between her mother and her aunt that sends her on a quest to unravel her mother's decades-long secret.

Black Butterflies by Priscilla Morris — An artist living in Sarajevo in 1992 sends her husband and elderly mother to safety in England. Shortlisted for the 2023 Women's Prize for Fiction.

Burn by Peter Heller — Two men who have been friends since childhood emerge from the woods of rural Maine to a dystopian country wracked by bewildering violence.



Five-Star Stranger by Kat Tang
— A top-rated man on the "Rental Stranger" app plays many roles for his clients but forms an unexpected attachment to a young girl whose father he is pretending to be.

A Great Marriage by Frances Mayes — When a perfect wedding is called off just days before the big event, it sends two people—and their families—into a tailspin.

The Hidden Book by Kirsty Manning — Prisoners of war during World War Two risk their lives to safeguard evidence of Nazi atrocities.



House of Glass by Sarah **Pekkanen** — A nine-year-old girl who witnesses the possible murder of her nanny in the midst of her parent's bitter divorce immediately stops speaking.

Hum by Helen Phillips — After losing her job to AI, a wife and mother undergoes a procedure that renders her undetectable to surveillance.

Interpretations of Love by Jane Campbell — During a wedding weekend, a group of

Jane Campbell — During a wedding weekend, a group of people try to navigate the challenging aftershocks of war.

I Need You to Read This by Jessa Maxwell — An advice columnist decides to investigate after her predecessor is murdered.



The Perfect Son by Frieda McFadden — A mother must decide how far she'll go to protect her son after a high school girl vanishes from her quiet suburban neighborhood and he was the last one to see her alive.

Plays Well with Others by Sophie Brickman — A parenting advice columnist goes to incredible lengths to try to get her precocious son into one of NYC's elite kindergarten classes.

The Seventh Veil of Salome by Silvia Moreno-Garcia — In 1950s Hollywood, an unknown Mexican young woman lands a star-making role in a big-budget movie about the legendary Salome and becomes the object of envy.

The Singer Sisters by Sarah Seltzer — The alt rocker daughter of a reclusive 1960s folk legend is touring and becoming famous while unintentionally uncovering some family secrets.



Talking to Strangers by Fiona Barton — A detective's investigation into a woman's murder is derailed by a reporter who insists on doing her own sleuthing.

There Are Rivers in the Sky by Elif Shafak — The lives of three people living on the banks of the River Thames and the River Tigris are curiously touched by the epic of Gilgamesh.



The Unicorn Woman by Gayl Jones — After the end of World War Two, a Black army veteran returns home expecting accolades and finds a segregated community instead.

Worst Case Scenario by T.J.

Newman — A commercial airliner filled with passengers crashes into a nuclear power plant in the small town of Waketa, Minnesota after its pilot has a heart attack while flying the plane.

Part III of III: **The Forest from (out of) the Trees**





When it opened in 1982, EPCOT Center's centerpiece attraction Spaceship Earth posited that more than any other scientific field, communication was the cornerstone of civilization. Science-fiction author Ray Bradbury penned the <u>original concept for the attraction</u> which featured vignettes of notable historical advancements in record-keeping, dissemination of knowledge, and in record-keeping, dissemination of knowledge, and information accessing. Bradbury was heavily inspired by contemporary philosopher Buckminster Fuller, who first coined the term "Spaceship Earth" to describe Earth's closed system of resources, much like a giant spaceship on which all of humanity is part of the crew. Fuller's **Operating Manual for Spaceship Earth** details ways humanity can use the tools of communication to build a better world for all in the same humbling spirit as Carl Sagan's Pale Riue Dot or

world for all in the same humbling spirit as Carl Sagan's Pale Blue Dot or Russell Schweickart's <u>No Frames</u>, <u>No Boundaries</u>. In its 1994 iteration, the attraction narration warns of the dangers posed by the Internet's oncoming "flood of electronic babble" before concluding with a vibrant visions of futuristic communications bringing people closer together to create a more empathetic "global neighborhood." However, its 2007 iteration replaced this optimistic ending with a proto-Al generated video showcasing "YOUR Future" and how advancements in technology will affect "you" directly and individually.

In all of its iterations, Spaceship Earth acknowledges the early contributions of the Phoenicians to the development of a pan-cultural language. Often relegated to footnotes in Greco-Roman history, Classics professor Carolina Lopez-Ruiz finally places the Phoenicians at the center of their own story in her book **Phoenicians and the Making of the Mediterranean**. Rather than establishing colonies of conquest, the early Phoenicians sailed across the Mediterranean (with ships made from the Lebanese cedar forests) and settled among other native communities in order to trade goods and exchange traditions. (Denise Demetriou's **Phoenicians Among Others** details the importance of these early migrations in the ancient Mediterranean while drawing comparisons to the cultural benefits of immigration today.) In order to facilitate communication with the various Mediterranean communities the Phoenicians designed a common alphabet (technically an abjad) based on Egyptian hieroglyphs. These characters became the basis for the Greek, Latin, and (eventually) Arabic alphabets. Because of their vocation as merchants, the Phoenicians were also among the first to keep paper records. The Greeks named the Phoenicians' most prominent city "Byblos" which became the word biblion meaning "book," named after the city's extensive paper records—a city of

Italo Calvino's *If on a winter's night a traveler* is many books in one. The book begins with its unnamed protagonist reading the titular book, but upon finishing chapter two realizes the book has become another story entirely. The remaining chapters alternate between the main protagonist's search for the remainder of Calvino's book and the first chapters of other books the protagonist finds on the journey. Along the way the protagonist befriends a woman named Ludmilla, another soul in search of Calvino's book. In its post-modern way, If on a winter's night a traveler reveals by its last chapter that the entire purpose of a book is to bring people together, to share in a story and, in so





Helen Oyeyemi's 2024 novel **Parasol Against the** Axe reads like a spiritual successor to Calvino's If on a winter's night a traveler. The book's protagonist Hero Tojosoa is visiting Prague for a bachelorette weekend when she realizes the book she has brought with her, Paradoxical Undressing, contains different text each time it is opened. All of the text within follows stories of people from throughout Prague's history, illuminating the places Hero visits while exploring the city. The book seems to be a manifestation of the memory of Prague itself and demonstrates that the "city of a hundred spires" is not just its brick and mortar, but is also the story of all who have

ever lived in and visited it. Just as you can't separate a forest from its trees, you can't separate a city from its inhabitants.

Amor Towles' **Table for Two** features a series of short stories all taking place in one of the largest urban forests, New York, the "city that never sleeps." Each

short story focuses on the meeting of two people and how certain meetings can alter the trajection of our individual stories. Each one is also influenced in some way by the city itself—a place where stories meet, coalesce, merge, and diverge.




Every Day by David Levithan offers a window into the variety of stories that take place simultaneously each day across the planet. Protagonist A has a condition which causes them to inhabit different bodies at random forcing them to confront each person's story they find themselves in while simultaneously trying to tell their own story and construct their own identity. David Mitchell's **Cloud** Atlas makes a great counterpoint to Every Day. Instead of showing the multitude of stories which occur on any given day, *Cloud Atlas* examines how the same overarching stories repeat themselves across great lengths of time. The book contains six stories, all contained within each other like

Matryoshka Dolls, separated by hundreds of years from the past to the future.

Cixin Liu's **Three-Body Problem** series repeatedly reminds readers of how we are like bugs in the scale of the universe and how important communication and cooperation are if we are ever to survive within the galactic "dark forest." The series also reminds us that things might not always work best in threes, exemplified within the series by the Trisolaris system, but outwardly by the series' "fourth" book, **The Redemption of Time** by Baoshu. This short volume began as a fan-fiction before being canonized by Liu as the conclusion of the series. The book itself is divisive, with some readers condemning its existence and others comparing it to a glass of limoncello after a three course meal. However, it demonstrates that stories never really end. They go on living in the minds of all those who read them, and sometimes they manifest themselves into the world.

Peter Brooks' nonfiction book **Seduced By Story** analyzes the way people have become accustomed to communicating in the form of stories and the way we've begun to see our own lives as stories. However, he also cautions readers that stories can be abused and used to manipulate. He discusses tropes such as unreliable narrators, noting how and when unreliable narrators succeed in convincing readers that their stories are true.

Rebecca Kuang's Babel takes place in a fictional 1800s Oxford University where students use silver bars etched with words to manifest each word's meaning in the form of reality-altering magic. With the discovery of this power, Britain sets out to conquer other cultures in order to steal their languages and words and translate them into English for the magical powers they might posses, often without an understanding or appreciation of how those words were forged in their cultures of origin. The British Empire is challenged by the secret Hermes Society which seeks to free the captured languages.



One of the oldest American institutions, the United States Postal Service, was created to provide all citizens with the ability to communicate with each other. In **Neither Snow Nor Rain**, author Devin Leonard recounts the establishment of a communication network that sought to reach everyone, no matter where they were located. Similarly, the idea that libraries should be free and open to the public developed in America in the 1800s. In **Part of Our Lives** author Wayne A. Wiegand discusses how the American library transformed the way humanity thought about information and access to it. Today any story is free for the masses to discover and share with each other thanks to these forests of books—a place where stories meet, coalesce, merge, and diverge.



As we travel through life sometimes we get full pictures of other people's stories and other times we only get fleeting impressions. Olga Tokarczuk's **Flights** is a fragmentary novel that seeks to encapsulate this human experience. Chapters range from thirty pages to a single sentence following travelers from across history using all modes of transportation—some individuals are famous, but most are ordinary. From airports to train stations and from ancient Mediterranean merchants to present day ferry drivers, Flights imbues readers with the notion that our stories don't exist in isolation, that we are all part of a greater narrative that has been unfolding since time immemorial—a narrative

that we can never see completely, but can glimpse through the stories of others. Together, our words steer our miraculous spaceship, Earth.
